Pyramid Lake Re-Opening to the Public November 2, 2020

Online permit sales and Ranger Station On-line sales only

NIXON – On October 16, 2020, the Pyramid Lake Paiute Tribal Council approved the re-opening of Pyramid Lake for day use, camping, boating and fishing on Monday, November 2, 2020. Included with the re-opening of Pyramid Lake was the approval of Section 30 - COVID Guidelines, to be added to the Pyramid Lake Regulations Brochure. These guidelines are placed into effect during a declaration of emergency of the COVID-19 Pandemic by the Pyramid Lake Paiute Tribal Council. The Pyramid Lake Tribal Council had stated a declaration of emergency in April 2020 for the Pyramid Lake Paiute Indian Reservation, and as a result, implemented new guidelines and regulations for lake usage. The Pyramid Lake Paiute Tribal Council at this time has approved a new fee schedule effective with the opening of the lake.

State Route 446 will reopen to public passage November 2, 2020.

SECTION 30: COVID-19/Pandemic GUIDELINES

30.1 DEFINITIONS. For the purposes of this section, the following guidelines will apply to minimize the risks of COVID-19 within the designated boundaries of the Reservation. Guidelines will be placed into effect upon a declaration of emergency and will remain in effect until cancelled by the Pyramid Lake Paiute Tribal Council.

- Observe CDC guidelines to mitigate COVID-19 (e.g. Practice social distancing, wear face coverings, frequently wash hands, use of hand sanitizer.)
- Online permit sales and Ranger Station On-line sales only.
- Day use available 7 days a week.
- Camping Permitting – maximum 3 day camping only
- 10 people max per campsite, 2 vehicles, 1 recreational vehicle per site
- 10 permits per beach at 12 beaches with exception of Pelican Beach -20 permits for camping
- 13 permitted public beaches for camping
 - Warrior Point, Windless Bay, Pelican Point, Marina, North Nets/Long beach, Washout, Tamaracks, Indian Head Rock, Blockhouse, Wino Beach, Sandhole, Rawhide and Popcorn Beach.
- **No seasonal permitting at this time**

Road closures will be lifted November 2, 2020

We are hopeful that these measures will continue to keep our residents/tribal members safe from any exposure as well as support the continued health and wellness of our visitors.

Additionally, the current road closures will be lifted on November 2, 2020 on State Route 445 and State Route 446.

The Tribe would like to extend our sincerest thank you to all of the residents, Tribal Members, and visitors to Pyramid Lake for your patience and understanding during the closure period, and welcome back our valued customers to beautiful Pyramid Lake, Nevada.

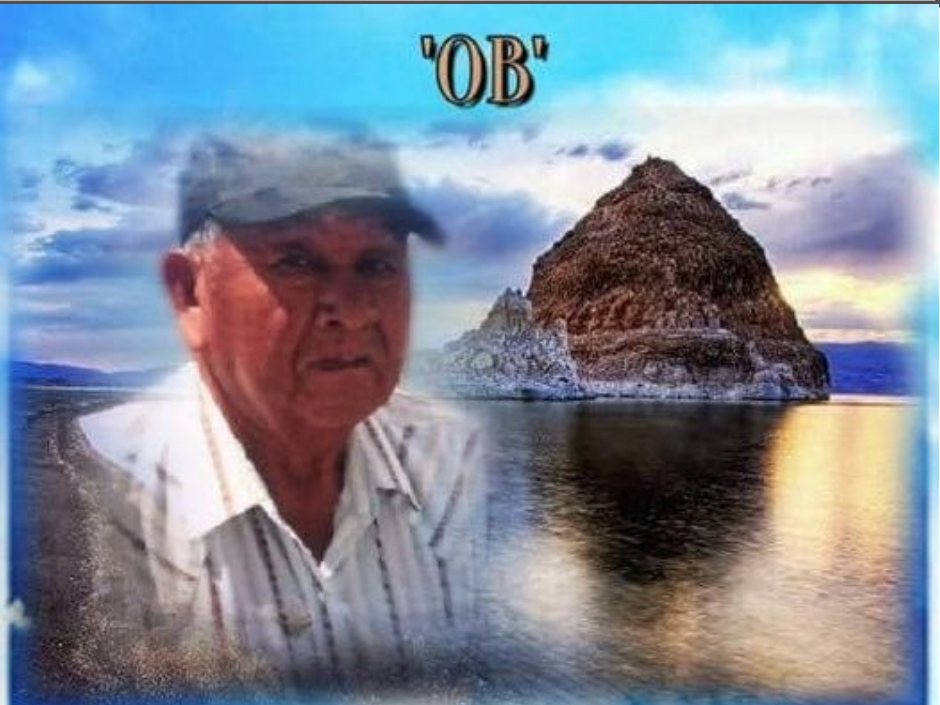

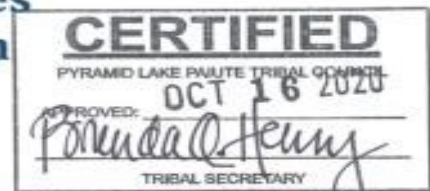

Dam Changes In Nevada Give Rare Trout New Life 115 Years Later

WADSWORTH, Nev. (AP) — U.S. and tribal officials are celebrating completion of a \$34 million fish bypass system at a Nevada dam that will allow a threatened trout species to return to some of its native spawning grounds for the first time in more than a century.

Construction of the side channel with fish-friendly screens is a major step toward someday enabling Lahontan cutthroat trout to make the same 100-mile (160-kilometer) journey — upstream from a desert lake on tribal land northeast of Reno to Lake Tahoe atop the Sierra — that they did before the dam was built in 1905.

“This is a great day for conservation,”

said Paul Souza, the regional director of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service who said it wouldn’t have been possible without support from the Pyramid Lake Paiute Tribe.

“This is an iconic species. This project is going to help get it home,” he said at a ceremony Wednesday at Derby Dam on the Truckee River 20 miles (32 kilometers) east of Reno. The U.S. Bureau of Reclamation began reconfiguring the dam just a year ago in partnership with the USFWS, Pyramid Lake Paiute Tribe and Farmers Conservation Alliance, a nonprofit group that developed the screens.

Brenda Burman, head of the bureau, said the quick work combined the alliance’s innovative technology with the service’s biological experience and the bureau’s engineering and construction expertise.

“And in the background, pushing and making sure this all happened, we had the relentlessness of the Pyramid Lake Paiute Tribe to recover the fish that they hold sacred,” she said. The largest trout in North America, Lahontan cutthroats grew as big as 60 pounds (27 kilograms) when they climbed 2,500 feet (762 meters) through mountain river canyons to Lake Tahoe on the California-Nevada line, elevation 6,228 feet (1,898 meters).

In recent years, they’ve made their way several miles upstream from Pyramid Lake but haven’t been able to get past the 30-foot-high (9 meters) dam.

Commissioned by President Theodore Roosevelt, the dam was part of the first major irrigation system established in the West to “help make the desert bloom,” diverting water to farmers and ranchers in a region where only about 5 inches (12 centimeters) of rain falls annually.

The new bypass houses an 80-foot-wide (24 meters), 390-foot-long (118 meters) horizontal fish screen — actually a metal plate with slots that pushes water down through the water sys-



tem while sending the fish and other debris through the side channel. The Farmers Irrigation District of Hood River, Oregon, first developed the design after severe flooding in 1996. The district licensed the patent to the alliance, which since has completed 50 projects in seven Western states. This one is the largest and the first commissioned by the Bureau of Reclamation.

“It is really amazing to think a year ago we stood here not knowing about pandemics, fires, all the challenges that would come up ahead of us. And yet we are all here today seeing these screens turn on,” said Julie O’Shea, the alliance’s executive director. “It provides a spark of hope for future generations about what the possibilities are for restoration and recovery of a species.”

Tribal leaders and state and federal wildlife officials have been working for two decades to restore the fishery in Pyramid Lake — a remnant of ancient Lake Lahontan, an inland sea that covered 8,450 square miles (21,885 square kilometers) of western Nevada during the Ice Age. The trout was thought to have gone extinct in the 1940s and was listed as threatened in 1970. But a remnant population later was discovered in a small brook along the Nevada-Utah border.

Cutthroat trout also are native to parts of Oregon, Utah and Wyoming.

Tribal Chairman Anthony Sampson said the project is “safeguarding a precious resource of the tribe. We have to be vigilant to protect and restore what God created for us,” Sampson said. “Everything we do has an impact on life — not just plant life, not just animal life, but all lives.”

Quarantine is used to keep someone *who might have been exposed to COVID-19* away from others. People in quarantine should stay home, separate themselves from others, monitor their health, and follow directions from their state or local health department.



Stay home and monitor your health

1. Stay home for 14 days after your last contact with a person who has COVID-19
2. Watch for fever (100.4°F), cough, shortness of breath, new loss of taste or smell or **other symptoms** of COVID-19
3. If possible, stay away from others, especially people who are at **higher risk** for getting very sick from COVID-19





Your Diabetes Decision-Making Guide to the 2020 Election

As healthcare professionals, we have a responsibility to ensure the rights and wellbeing of people with diabetes are protected. By making informed decisions, we can work together to create better outcomes for all people with diabetes, prediabetes and other cardiometabolic conditions. Here are 3 actions you can take today to evaluate proposed healthcare legislation and candidates' healthcare platforms.

Understand 4 core principles that must be reflected in all healthcare proposals.

1. Enhances access to affordable services, medications, devices and supplies for all people with diabetes.
2. Includes guaranteed coverage of a comprehensive set of essential health services required by people with diabetes to manage the disease.
3. Supports development of and access to innovative diabetes-related medications, devices, supplies and technology.
4. Promotes programs that reduce cost, improve care and foster innovation.

Verify that proposed legislation or platform includes these provisions.

- ★ **Preserves elimination of preexisting condition exclusions.**
As part of the Affordable Care Act, health insurers can no longer charge more, deny coverage, or limit benefits for people with diabetes and other chronic conditions.
- ★ **Prioritizes prevention and screening.**
ADCES supports policy positions that prioritize access to proven screenings and the necessary follow-up, as well as preventative services. Positions should include robust funding for prevention and public health initiatives.
- ★ **Prohibits discrimination in plan design.**
ADCES believes that health plans should not make coverage decisions, determine reimbursement rates, establish incentive programs, or design benefits in ways that discriminate against individuals because of their age, disability, expected length of life, etc.

Use the official campaign website to contact campaigns directly and speak to campaign staff about a candidate's proposals.

Attend local townhall or networking events to interact with candidates firsthand. Look at their campaign websites for upcoming events.
