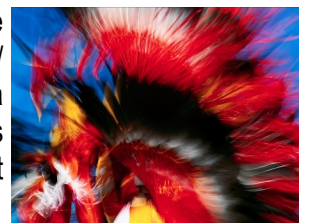
There are no words that can express how many feel seeing the ugliness of these areas, but pictures do speak louder than words.

Nevada Magazine's July/August 2011 issue is available on newsstands throughout Nevada. The Indian Territory Special Edition highlights the state's 27 federally recognized tribes and the colonies, reservations, and towns they call home. Included in the issue is a feature on American Indians in Nevada who are working diligently to keep their native traditions - such as ancient hunting techniques and centuries-old languages - alive. A piece on rock art, technically known as petroglyphs and pictographs, explores the significance of these ancient markings and where in the state they can be viewed. The issue also contains a special yearlong Indian events listing and a story about the beautiful and inspirational native celebrations called powwows, or fandangos. Finally, the issue looks back on the life of famous historical figure Sarah Winnemucca, and additional stories - including fishing at Pyramid Lake and Fernley's Wigwam Native American Museum - can be found online at nevadamagazine.com.

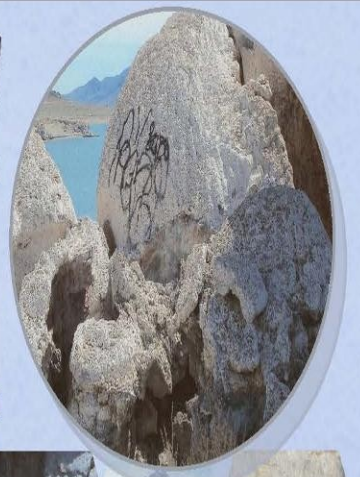


FUN ACTIVITIES FOR THE KIDS

Burning Man Local Ticket Registration Information for

Burning Man has listened to your feedback and have redesigned this process with your convenience in mind. New for 2011: If you would like to attend Burning Man 2011 you can register for your discounted Local ticket through the Tribal Offices until August 1st.

Please contact Scott Carey or Carol Smith at the Tribal Offices (scarey@plpt.nsn.us or csmith@plpt.nsn.us) or at 775-574-1000 to be verified as a Tribal Member and resident. Your information will then be added to the local ticket list.

Here's everything you need to know to register for your ticket:

- * You must be a Tribal Member and live on the reservation
- * No payment is taken at registration
- * Payment is taken when you pick up your ticket at Burning Man

The information needed: your full name, physical address, email address and phone number.

FAQ:

How much is the local ticket?

- * Local tickets are \$40 (one per local).
- * Each local is allowed to purchase (2) \$160 tickets when they purchase their local ticket.

If you miss the August 1st registration deadline, you will need to register in Gerlach the week before Burning Man. The Tribal Offices will have that information at a later date.

When and where do I pick up my ticket?

- * Beginning Monday, August 29th you can pick up your ticket at the box office (at the front gate of Burning Man).
- * The Burning Man event is Monday, August 29th through September 5th.
- * The box office closes at noon on Saturday, September 5th.

Tips For Success -- The Interview

It is important to be on time for an interview. It is best if you arrive about 15 minutes early. This will give you time to relax and fill out an application, if necessary. Dress appropriately, since the first impression is a lasting one.

Interview Tips

1. Do some research on the business before the interview. (See "How to Find a Job," "Research the Employer.")
2. Practice interviewing.
3. Go alone. Do not take children or friends.
4. Greet the employer with a handshake.
5. Make frequent eye contact.
6. Smile, be polite, and try to relax.
7. Listen carefully to the questions asked. Ask the interviewer to restate a question if you are confused.
8. Answer questions as directly as possible.
9. Be upbeat and make positive statements.
10. If you've worked before, talk about what you learned from it.
11. Use examples of how your skills and abilities would fit the job.

Bring your "Fact Sheet" with telephone numbers and addresses of your references and former employers, just in case you are asked to complete an application. (See "The Application," "Fact Sheet.")

It is important as you prepare for your interview to anticipate what questions the employer might ask. The following questions are examples of the types of questions that you may be asked to answer.

Questions to Expect (What the Employer May Ask You):

1. Tell me about yourself. (This is often an ice-breaker question. Keep the answer job or skill related.)
2. What do you know about the type of work we do? (This is your chance to tell what you know from the research you completed ahead of time.)
3. What is your weakness? (Always make this a positive answer. For example, "My spelling is not always perfect, so I always use a spell checker.")
4. What are your strengths? (Describe your skills in a way that will show you as a desirable employee for the company.)
5. Why did you leave your last job? (Answer with a positive statement. Try not to say: "I was fired," "terminated," "quit," "had no babysitter," or "couldn't get along with coworkers or supervisor". However, you can say: "new job," "contract ended," "seasonal," "temporary," "career change," "returned to school," to raise a family," or "relocated.")
6. Why have you been unemployed for such a long time? (Tell the truth. Emphasize that you were looking for a good company where you can settle and make a contribution.)
7. Why should we hire you? (Make a positive statement, such as "I would like the opportunity to work with you and believe that I can do the work.")

Do you have references? (It is most important that you contact your references ahead of time and

have their name, current address, and telephone numbers.)

At the end of the formal interview the employer will ask if you have any questions. The following are examples of acceptable questions to ask.

Questions To Ask The Employer:

1. Who would supervise me?
2. When are you going to make a hiring decision?
3. What are the opportunities for advancement?
4. What kind of training is provided or available?
5. Is there a dress code?

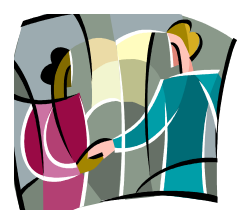
Pitfalls (Reasons Why People Don't Get Hired):

- Untidy personal appearance
- Inability to express information clearly
- Lack of genuine interest or enthusiasm
- Unwillingness to start at the bottom
- Negative attitude
- Lack of eye contact
- Incomplete or sloppy application
- Being late for the interview

Closing

At the end of the interview:

- Thank the interviewers for their time.
- Request a business card.
- Shake hands in closing.

VISION STATEMENT

The Pyramid Lake Paiute Tribe acknowledges that violence against Native Women exists.

The Victim Services Program restores the respect of our women, strengthens our families, builds hope in our community, and creates a positive, non-violent vision which inspires others.

In an effort to stop violence against women, we are committed to working together for the common goals of empowering women in taking control of their lives, by promoting awareness of violence against women, and by having abusers acknowledge their violence and be responsible for their behavior.

(Created on February 14, 2008)

The Victim Services Program opened its doors in April of 1998, under the STOP Violence Against Indian Women Grant, from the Department of Justice. Since that time, additional funds were applied for and the program grew to what it is today.

In April 2000, the program was approved to utilize a home that was acquired by the Tribe for an emergency women's shelter, "Our Mothers' House-Tamme Pea Nobe." Throughout the years, the program has provided services to 50-60 victims, on an annual basis.

The support from the community by ways of donations (clothing and household goods) is much

appreciated. The donations not only assist the program participants with their needs, the donations are also counted as In-kind Matches for two of our current grants (Family Violence Prevention & Services and Victims of Crime Act).

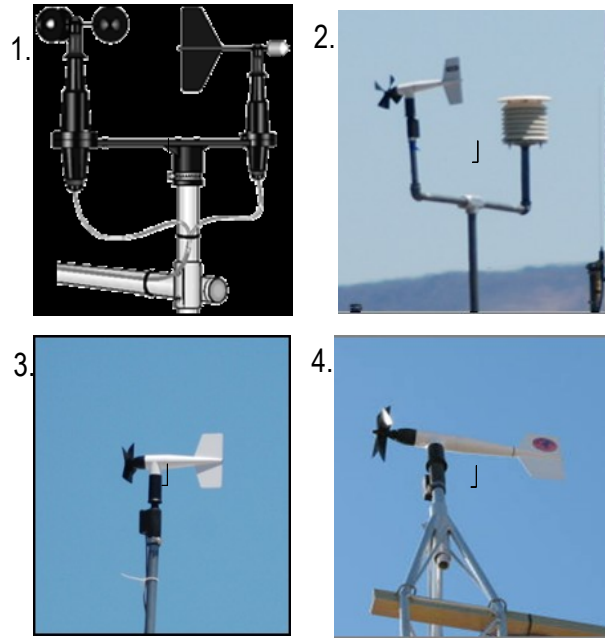

KINDS OF WEATHER EQUIPMENT AND WHAT IT DOES.

 While I was at the Wadsworth Air Quality site working on the weather and air quality equipment, Rochelle walked by and asked me what kind of equipment was on the top of the tower. She asked a good question because we have an odd looking wind speed/ wind direction sensor there. Well, odd is not the word – “modern” is more like it since most of the sensors on the Reservation are similar except for North Lake Air Quality Station that has one of the “old” kind. Here are some different kinds of wind sensors around the Reservation:



Figure(s): 1. Wind speed and direction sensors at North Lake (Astor Pass), 2. Sutcliffe (Fisheries), 3. Nixon Junior/Senior High School, and 4. Wadsworth (near Natchez Elementary School).

The last three are like propellers. The older models have separate wind direction vanes and cup anemometers.

For wind direction you need something that is fairly flat to catch the wind but rotates to indicate direction. A flag is a good example, also a wind “vane”. The difference is that there is no direction indicator on the flag, and the direction it flies shows where the wind is going, but for weather purposes the wind is always given as where the wind comes from. (This flag is at the Nixon Post Office on a day when the wind was coming from the North. The wind vane shows a day when the wind was also blowing from the North – a flag would have lined up with the tail on the vane.)



For the fancy wind direction sensors we use (where we need to keep a continuous record), the direction is converted to a voltage. It gets tricky for North because North is either 0 degrees or 360 degrees and we use a program to properly handle the data (if you average for 5 minutes and half the readings are 0 and half are 360 the average would be 180 which is South which is incorrect).

For wind speed you need something that spins around based on the wind speed. Long ago, when I was in Junior High School, my Dad and I made an anemometer from coat hangers and tin cans. We painted one cup white and the others black. After creation, we took a ride in the car and Dad drove 10 miles per hour while I was holding the anemometer out the window and counting the number of times the white cup came around for 30 seconds. He then sped up 20 miles per hour. I counted again. As we increased speed those cups were going around pretty fast so eventually I lost count. That is the same principle with our electronic sensors. They put out a larger voltage when the speed is higher. Instead of using a car for calibrating the sensor we have a “spinner” that spins the anemometer at a given speed and we make sure the voltage matches. Here is a picture of our latest calibration/audit in May when the Bishop Paiute Tribe evaluated our Wadsworth equipment.

The spinner replaces the propeller.



You can look on the internet for plans on how to build simple anemometers.

A Cool Book

My husband recently bought a book that has four tours of the Reno Area including a detailed one of parts of Pyramid Lake. It is Special Publication 19 of the Nevada Bureau of Mines and Geology called “Geologic and Natural History Tours in the Reno Area: Expanded Edition” from 2005 by Tingley, Pizarro, Ross, Purkey, and Garside. It starts with the Geology of the area, the Explorers and Emigrants, mines, Railroads, and Gambling.

Skipping directly to the fourth tour which is Pyramid Lake, there are maps, pictures of tufa galore, two pages of color plates of mountains, the river, lake, critters, and wildflowers. There are elements of history, geology, encounters between cultures, and much more. The tour is organized using your car’s odometer (so you don’t have to find the mile markers on the road.) There are sidebars of Fremont’s first observations of Pyramid Lake, how the Truckee River was named, Pyramid Lake fisheries, and a history of Derby Dam and the Newlands irrigation projects and their effects on lowering the levels of Pyramid and Winnemucca Lakes. The trip starts in Reno, goes to Wadsworth, to Nixon (optional side trip to Marble Bluff), then from Nixon to the turn to Reno (with optional trip to Sutcliffe), then back by the BLM Wild Horse and Burro adoption facility and back to Reno. There are one hundred and fifty two suggested stops along the way.

Love the pictures – especially the one of the coyote leaping up a tufa.

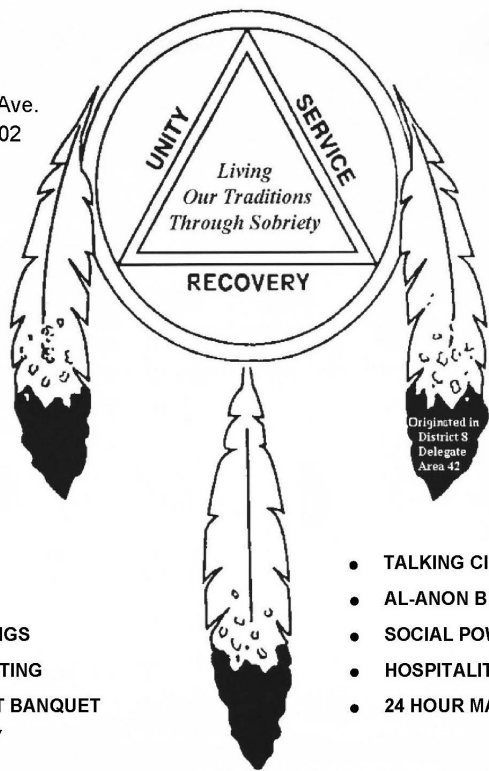

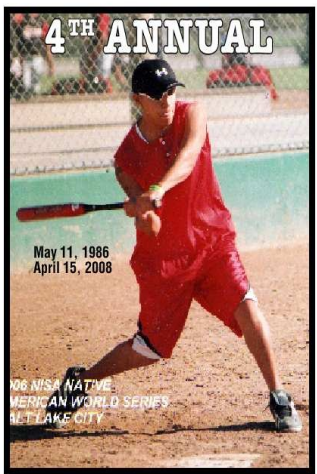

The Office of Tribal Enrollment is open Monday through Friday during normal work hours closing for lunch between 12:00 and 12:30pm. Please call ahead of time to ensure that staff is available to process your requests.

Please be sure to sign and date the form before mailing to the Enrollment Office.

ID Card Issuance Policy: The proposed amendments to the Card Issuance Policy were review by the Tribal Council and approved at the June 2, 2011 Council Meeting. The amendments will only affect the adoptive membership cards.

Regular Membership: The Pyramid Lake Paiute Tribes regular membership is based on direct decendancy. Direct decendancy means there can be no break in the line of progression on the person's family tree, there must be a direct tie to the Base Roll.

Adoptive Membership: Requires a ¼ blood quantum or more of Pyramid Lake Paiute blood and must receive the endorsement of the Tribal Council by an affirmative 2/3 vote of its members.

Dual Enrollment: Dual enrollment is prohibited by the Pyramid Lake Paiute Tribe. Any person, who is enrolled, affiliated or recognized as a member of another Indian tribe, colony or band is considered to be dually enrolled.

JOHNSON O'MALLEY PROGRAM

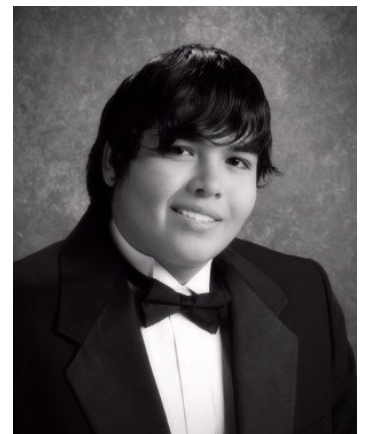
